
EDUCATION

Education is a core component of the Wyoming PBS mission. Last year, the team led outreach events, engaging with school staff and students across the state:

- Staff took Cat in the Hat on the annual Early Literacy Tour, visiting classrooms and libraries in Riverton, Cheyenne, Torrington, Douglas, and Glenrock.
- Five more schools received educational fossil digs at quarries in southwest Wyoming, supported by Fossil Country film sponsors Dr. Betty Buckingham Baril, Wyoming Humanities, the Wyoming Cultural Trust Fund, and the MAS Revocable Trust.

 Education coordinator Carol Garber attended seven conferences, sharing PBS LearningMedia resources with hundreds of educators.







STORIES WE TOLD

HEADWINDS: BIKEPACKING THE RED DESERT

Last spring, Wyoming PBS premiered *Headwinds: Bikepacking the Red Desert*, a visually stunning, 30-minute documentary that follows four

adventurous bikepackers as they traverse one of Wyoming's most remote and little-known landscapes. As they navigate wind, solitude, and rugged terrain, the group uncovers the rich geology, history, and spirit of the Red Desert, offering viewers a rare glimpse into a wild and storied corner of the state.

WYOMING CHRONICLE

Now in its 17th season, *Wyoming Chronicle* continues to spotlight the unique voices and stories that shape our state. This past season featured a diverse range of topics—from the groundbreaking of a nuclear power plant and the tribute to a beloved K9, to the towering Abraham Lincoln monument along Interstate 80. One impactful episode explored new state and local efforts aimed at addressing Wyoming's persistently high suicide rate. Each 30-minute episode offered viewers a compelling look at the people, places, art, and history that make Wyoming distinctive. Tune in to new episodes Fridays at 7:30 p.m.

CAPITOL OUTLOOK

Each session, *Capitol Outlook* brings viewers inside Wyoming's Legislature with in-depth interviews and weekly updates. Hosted by Public Affairs Senior Producer Steve Peck, last season featured candid conversations with Gov. Mark Gordon, legislative leaders, and different perspectives about the happenings at the Capitol.

Catch Season 20 every Friday at 7:30 p.m. during the session.



A STATE OF MIND

Wyoming PBS continued its vital exploration of mental health through new episodes of A State of Mind, our documentary series focused on the emotional and psychological challenges facing our communities. The award-winning series wrapped its second season with episodes covering a powerful range of topics, from the impact of high-potency cannabis use on Wyoming youth to the often-overlooked mental health struggles of coal miners. The season also examined the tragic story of Wyoming country singer songwriter Luke Bell, as well as the realities faced by individuals

CALL OF THE WEST

Call of the West is a visually stunning epic documentary that explores the enduring spirit of the American West through the lens of dude ranching—an iconic tradition born of grit, hospitality, and heritage. Set against sweeping Western landscapes, the documentary follows multigenerational ranching families as they confront the pressures of modernization, economic uncertainty, and cultural change.

Through intimate storytelling and powerful visuals, *Call of the West* captures the challenges and triumphs of those fighting to preserve a way of life that remains deeply rooted in the American identity.


This film is a co-production with MOUNTAIN PBS and directed by Alepheus Media.



In partnership with Nashville PBS, Wyoming PBS co-produced *Made in the West*, a film that explores American functional art—handcrafted furniture, tools, clothing, and more—with a focus on the Western


aesthetic. Through interviews with artisans, historians, and educators across the country, the project examines the cultural influences shaping this art form and highlights efforts to preserve it for future generations. A key partner, Cody-based nonprofit By Western Hands, is working to inspire and train young artists through hands-on programs in collaboration with the University of Wyoming. The production aims to raise awareness of functional art and promote artistic trades as viable career paths.

This film is a co-production with Nashville PBS.



REMEMBERING AL

As part of our commitment to serving Wyoming through meaningful public service broadcasting, Wyoming PBS was honored to provide live coverage of two significant memorial events honoring the life and legacy of former U.S. Sen. Alan K. Simpson (1931-2025).

In late March, we broadcast and live streamed a public celebration of life held at the University of Wyoming's Arena-Auditorium in Laramie. This event, which celebrated the remarkable life and contributions of Sen. Simpson, was also carried nationally on C-SPAN. Two days later, we simulcast the

private memorial service from the Christ Episcopal Church in Cody, allowing viewers across the state and beyond to pay their respects.

Both events were made available for on-demand viewing via the Wyoming PBS website, YouTube channel, and PBS app, ensuring broad access to these important commemorations. We extend our deepest condolences to the Simpson family and are proud to have played a role in honoring the memory of such a distinguished public servant.



Last October, Wyoming PBS hosted live debates for the state's U.S. Senate and House races at Central Wyoming College in Riverton. BRINGING GOVERNMENT TO THE PEOPLE

Wyoming PBS continued live streaming Legislative Service Office (LSO) meetings held off site from the Capitol, providing access to all Wyoming residents. The team provided streaming of more than **two dozen committee meetings** in the last year. All recordings are available to view anytime on the Wyoming Legislature YouTube channel. Wyoming PBS is only reimbursed for the direct costs of per diem, fuel, and lodging. We also supply the equipment used for streaming.

In addition to LSO coverage, the Wyoming PBS last year live streamed Gov. Mark Gordon's annual State of the State address and Wyoming Supreme Court Chief Justice Kate M. Fox's State of the Judiciary message to the 68th Wyoming Legislature. The Wyoming PBS team also live streamed the 42nd Annual Governor's Arts Awards in Cheyenne.

IN THE COMMUNITY

In 2024–25, we hosted screening events statewide, sparking conversations around mental health, art, adventure, and culture.
