

ANNIE MALONE'S LEGACY OF LOVE AND GENEROSITY

LOCAL TIES FOR A GLOBAL TYCOON

Based on **WTVP's Documentary**
My Journey with Annie Malone:
James Agbara Bryson

Born in 1869 in Metropolis, Illinois, Annie Turnbo was the second youngest of eleven children. Her parents were former slaves from Kentucky and both died while she was young.

Annie moved to Peoria to live with her married sister, Ada. She attended Peoria High School but was unable to finish due to health issues. But Ada's mother-in-law, Sarah Moody, took Annie under her wing, fostering her interest in chemistry and teaching her how to use herbs to alleviate common ailments resulting from hair straightening.

Since cornrows were associated with slavery, women used all kinds of greasy, heavy products to smooth out their locks. This led to serious scalp and hair problems. Annie and her sisters were determined to create a safer, healthier product. Eventually, they landed on the formula and began helping others in their community grow their hair back.

No one knows for sure how Annie and her younger sister Laura came up with the name Poro for their company. It might be a combination of their new last names from short-lived marriages. Or it could have derived from a West African word for spiritual and physical growth. Either way, it was the start of something big.

In 1902, Annie and Laura moved to the all-Black neighborhood of Lovejoy, now called Brooklyn, right across the river from St. Louis. This strategic location put them in proximity to the fourth largest population of African Americans in the nation. It also set them up to market their products at the 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis.

Annie married Aaron Malone in 1914 and continued to build her business. By 1917, she began construction on a new headquarters and manufacturing facility that took up a whole city block. Poro Corner was magnificent—four stories tall and over 100 rooms, including meeting rooms, a dormitory, an ice cream parlor, a bakery, an auditorium and a rooftop garden. The building was a hub of culture and community, providing a think tank for Black leaders and a venue for cultural, political and religious events.

The building was also home to the first African American college dedicated to cosmetology in the country. Students not only learned how to build a viable beauty career but also vital life skills. They were encouraged to create savings accounts and were incentivized to buy homes and invest in their communities. It was said that Poro-trained women earned ten times more than a domestic worker or laborer in the 1920s.

Poro College employed nearly 200 people in St. Louis. Through its school and franchise businesses—at least 32 other locations around the country—the college created jobs for almost 75,000 women in North and South America, Africa and the Philippines.

By the 1920s, Annie had become a multi-millionaire and used her newfound wealth as a means of generosity to her family and community. She put her nephews through college and law school. She donated to hospitals, Historically Black Colleges and Universities, the YMCA. In 1919, she funded an orphanage that continues today as the Annie Malone Children and Family Service Center. When Annie was asked about

her donations, she said, "This is not my money. This is God's money."

Annie's business thrived until 1927 when a series of setbacks whittled it down. Her husband Aaron filed for divorce, demanding half of the company. They settled out of court with Annie maintaining sole ownership but the legal battle was draining. Not long after moving the business to Chicago, the Great Depression struck, severely cutting into Poro sales. A fire destroyed one of Annie's buildings. And competing products ate into Poro's market share. The business kept going but was greatly reduced.

In the midst of it all, Annie stayed connected with her family in Peoria. Her nephews, now lawyers, did what they could to help the business. Annie often visited the home she once shared with her sister, bringing students and colleagues to enjoy their hospitality.

In May 1957, Annie suffered a fatal stroke. The company she founded continued into the 1990s, but the lives touched by her generosity and vision continue to add up even today. A street in St. Louis still bears her name and the nonprofit she founded hosts a parade each May in her honor.

RAISE YOUR HEAD UP: FREEDOM COLONIES IN AMERICA


MONDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 8 PM

► **GRASSLANDS**

BRIAN COLLINS IMMERSES HIMSELF IN THE VIETNAM WAR

Brian Collins, **WTVP's** new Corporate Support Manager, is still relatively new to Midwest winters. After living all over the world and, most recently, North Carolina, Brian invested in a thick winter coat and found a fascinating show on **WTVP Passport** to carry him through the long, cold, Illinois winter: an epic, 18-hour long documentary, *The Vietnam War*.

The series, produced by Ken Burns and Lynn Novick, is described as "visceral and immersive." The ten episodes explore "the human dimensions of the war through revelatory testimony of nearly 80 witnesses from all sides—Americans who fought in the war and others who opposed it, as well as combatants and civilians from North and South Vietnam."

Brian chose the program, not just for its length, but also because he's a history buff. "I'm big into American history, specifically military history. And the Vietnam War has always fascinated me because there's so many differing views on it. So anytime I can collect data on anything Vietnam, I like to."

He's only a few hours into the program and can already tell "it's very thorough!" Even with Brian's previous research, he's learning things through the documentary that he didn't know before, like Vietnam's colonization by the French and previous fights for independence.

Brian also appreciates how Burns and Novick present first-hand accounts and different perspectives. "So far, I think it's very unbiased. It gives both points of view on controversial issues." He does warn, however, that it can be graphic in places. "It doesn't sugarcoat the conditions. It's very realistic."

Just a few episodes in, Brian is enjoying the program and would recommend it to "anyone who's into American history and military history. Veterans in general I think would be interested." And there are plenty of long winter nights ahead to finish the saga.






OLYMPIC PRIDE, AMERICAN PREJUDICE explores the collective experiences of 18 African-American Olympians who defied Jim Crow and Adolf Hitler to win hearts and medals at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin. Set against the strained and turbulent atmosphere of a racially divided America, which was torn between boycotting Hitler's Olympics or participating in the Third Reich's grandest affair, the film follows 16 men and two women before, during and after their heroic turn of events at the Summer Olympic Games in Berlin. They represented a country that considered them second-class citizens and competed in a country that rolled out the red carpet for them despite an undercurrent of Aryan superiority and anti-Semitism.



MAJOR TAYLOR: CHAMPION OF THE RACE

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 7 PM

"In a word, I was a pioneer, and therefore had to blaze my own trail." - Marshall "Major" Taylor. He earned nicknames that often equated to the most powerful forces in heaven and earth: The Cyclone. The Whirlwind. The Comet. He earned the respect of civil rights pioneer Booker T. Washington and shook the hand of President Theodore Roosevelt, who sought out the great champion to congratulate him. Marshall Walter "Major" Taylor was the world's first Black sports superstar. Reporters simply called him "The Fastest Man in the World." MAJOR TAYLOR: CHAMPION OF THE RACE retraces the life and legacy of an American civil rights pioneer who set more than 20 world records in speed cycling during the heart of Jim Crow America. By the time he was in his early 20s, Major Taylor had claimed victory in the world cycling championship, the American cycling crown, and had set dozens of world speed cycling records all while having to endure withering racial pressures.
